South Asia

Nepal's Prime Minister Pushpa Kamal Dahal 'Prachanda' <u>won a vote of confidence</u> in Parliament on May 20, his fourth within 18 months of taking office. The vote became necessary after a coalition partner, the Janata Samajbadi Party (JSP), <u>withdrew its support</u> and quit the coalition government. The opposition Nepali Congress boycotted the voting process.

The Charter of the Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic Cooperation (BIMSTEC) <u>entered into force</u> on 20 May 2024. It paves the way for external partnerships and admission of observers and new members. The Charter was signed by the Heads of State and Government of the BIMSTEC member States during the Fifth Summit held virtually in Colombo, Sri Lanka, on 30 March 2022.

According to the Rapid Action Battalion (RAB) of Bangladesh, <u>illegal heavy</u> <u>weapons</u> are smuggled into the country through the Myanmar border by separatist groups based in the Rohingya camps in Ukhiya and Teknaf. The law enforcement forces on May 15 seized a large cache of firearms, including military-grade weapons, from a hideout of Myanmar's armed group, the Arakan Salvation Army (Arsa).

During a visit to Bangladesh on May 21-22, Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong held the first ministerial dialogue with the Foreign Minister of Bangladesh, Dr Hasan Mahmud. In a <u>Joint Statement</u>, both sides "reaffirmed their support for sovereignty and territorial integrity in the **Indo-Pacific**, democratic values, human rights, freedom of navigation and overflight, and the peaceful resolution of disputes".

The Maldives accused India of taking an <u>unauthorised sortie</u> by an Indian Navy helicopter. The India High Commission in Male dismissed the allegations saying Indian aviation platforms always operated according to the "agreed procedure and due authorisation". Meanwhile, the Indian External Affairs Ministry on May 18 said it was <u>ready to provide training</u> to Maldivian pilots to operate the Dornier aircraft if the Maldives government makes a formal request.

Cambodia and China commenced their <u>annual military drill "Golden Dragon"</u> on May 16, 2024. The 15-day military exercise will involve the participation of 2,000 troops, including 760 Chinese military personnel, 14 warships – three from China – two helicopters and 69 armoured vehicles and tanks. The drills are taking place at a remote training centre in central Kampong Chhnang province and in the sea off Preah Sihanouk province. Cambodian army spokesman Thong Solimo stated that the 2024 exercises were the "<u>biggest ever</u> <u>of their kind</u>".

Myanmar's army chief, <u>Min Aung Hlaing, held meetings with top ASEAN</u> officials on May 15 in the capital Naypyitaw. The military chief met with ASEAN special envoy Alounkeo Kittikhoun and Secretary-General Kao Kim Hourn. The two sides discussed "the best cooperation of Myanmar in ASEAN, the conditions of Myanmar's participation in ASEAN meetings", as reported by the Global New Light of Myanmar. <u>UN human rights chief</u>, Mr Volker Turk, expressed alarm over the resurgence of violence in Myanmar's Rakhine state and warned of further "atrocities" on May 19.

Russian President Vladimir Putin concluded a <u>two-day visit to China</u> on May 17, 2024. He met with President Xi Jinping of China and Li Qiang, Premier of the State Council. He attended the opening ceremony of the 2024-2025 China-Russia Cultural Year, a special concert marking the 75th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between China and Russia, and the 8th China-Russia Expo. The two sides agreed to "further deepen mutual military trust and cooperation" through expansion of military exercises, regular maritime and air patrols, and strengthening bilateral and multilateral coordination, according to the joint statement.

On <u>May 20</u>, Russia's Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov met with the Foreign Minister of China, Wang Yi, on the sidelines of the SCO in Astana, Kazakhstan. During their meeting, the ministers highlighted the importance of the increasing engagements which have deepened the comprehensive partnership relations and strategic interaction between the two nations. Furthermore, the ministers acknowledged the joint efforts of member states in upholding peace and stability in Eurasia. They also addressed various pressing issues including the Middle East process, developments in the Red Sea region and the Korean Peninsula.

Newly sworn-in President Lai Ching-te called on Beijing "<u>to cease their</u> <u>political and military intimidation against Taiwan</u>" in his inaugural speech on May 20. In his remarks, Lai broadcasted a message of peace and declared that a "glorious era of Taiwan's democracy has arrived," describing the island as an "important link" in a "global chain of democracies", while reiterating a determination to defend its sovereignty. When Chinese Foreign Ministry Spokesperson Wang Wenbin was asked about President Lai's remarks, <u>Wenbin stated</u>, "Taiwan independence leads nowhere. No matter what banner or pretext the separatists use, "Taiwan independence" is doomed to failure".

Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed shock at the death of Iran's President <u>Dr. Seyed Ebrahim Raisi</u> and Foreign Minister Hossein Amir-Abdollahian who died in a helicopter crash in the province of East Azerbaijan on May 20. Meanwhile, on May 21, the 'International Criminal Court' (ICC) prosecutor filed <u>arrest warrant applications against Hamas militants</u> Yahya Sinwar, Mohammed Diab Ibrahim Al-Masri, and Ismail Haniyeh bearing criminal responsibility for war crimes and crimes against humanity. The ICC prosecutor has also filed arrest warrant applications against Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Defence Minister Yoav Gallant.

In a statement, the US State Department categorically rejected the ICC's <u>"shameful" equivalence of Israel with Hamas</u> and its application to arrest Israel's Prime Minister and Defence Minister. On the other hand, European Union's Foreign and Security Policy Chief Josep Borrell called upon Parties to the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court (ICC) to <u>implement the court's rulings</u>.

On May 19, US National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan met Israeli leaders in Jerusalem. During the meeting, the two sides discussed the war in Gaza, including ongoing diplomatic efforts to secure the release of Israeli hostages as well as the <u>shared objective of defeating Hamas</u>. Earlier, Jake Sullivan met with Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince and Prime Minister Mohamed bin Salman in Dammam to discuss a comprehensive vision for an integrated Middle East.

The foreign ministers of Shanghai Cooperation Organization (SCO) member states convened for a <u>Council of Foreign Ministers</u> meeting in Astana on May 21. India's representative <u>Secretary (Economic Relations) of the Ministry of External Affairs</u> Dammu Ravi discussed preparations for the upcoming SCO Council of Heads of State Summit. China's Foreign Minister Wang Yi urged the SCO countries to uphold the "<u>Shanghai Spirit</u>" of mutual trust, mutual benefit, equality, consultation, respect for cultural diversity and common development. He emphasized the need to strengthen the organization to safeguard common interests and uphold international fairness and justice.

China's Foreign Minister, Wang Yi, travelled to Tajikistan and Kazakhstan before participating in the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Council of Ministers of Foreign Affairs from May 18 to 21. During his visit to Tajikistan (May 18-19), Wang Yi met with the President of Tajikistan Emomali Rahmon and held talks with Minister of Foreign Affairs Muhriddin. The two foreign ministers signed cooperation documents between the two foreign ministries. Minister Muhriddin stated that "China is an important strategic partner of Tajikistan," and given the complex and ever-changing regional situation, "Tajikistan is willing to work with China to implement global security initiatives and respond to security challenges jointly. On May 20, Wang Yi held talks with Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Nurtreu of Kazakhstan in Astana. This meeting is their second meeting in two months. During their meeting, the two sides emphasised that in the turbulent international situation, they must firmly safeguard the international system with the United Nations as the core and the international order based on international law, implement global development initiatives, global security initiatives and global civilisation initiatives, and unequivocally oppose unilateralism and hegemonic bullying behaviour to promote global governance in a more fair and reasonable direction.

The 2nd edition of the India–Australia–Indonesia <u>Trilateral Maritime Security</u> <u>Workshop (TMSW)</u> was conducted from May 15-17, at INS Dronacharya, Kochi. The theme of the workshop was 'Indian Ocean Region: Collaborative Efforts to Enhance Regional Maritime Security'. The workshop was conducted under the aegis of Headquarters Southern Naval Command and witnessed the participation of delegates from the three participating Navies.

In a demonstration of India's commitment to its 'Act East' and 'SAGAR' (Security and Growth for All in the Region) policies, three Indian Navy ships – INS Delhi, INS Shakti, and INS Kiltan – arrived in Manila, Philippines, on May 19th as part of their operational deployment to the South China Sea region. The Indian navy ships are set to conduct a <u>Maritime Partnership Exercise (MPX)</u> with the Philippine Navy off the western coast of the Philippines.

Prior to their arrival in Manila, on May 16th, the Indian Naval Ships participated in a similar <u>MPX or Passage Exercise (PASSEX)</u> with their counterparts from the Royal Malaysian Navy, KD Kelantan and KD Keris.

On May 17, the Indonesian naval ship KRI Sultan Thaya Syaifuddin and Maritime Patrol Aircraft P-8305 arrived at Port Blair to participate in the <u>42nd</u> <u>edition of India-Indonesia Coordinated Patrol</u> (IND-INDO CORPAT).
