## South Asia

Sirajuddin Haqqani, the Interior Minister of the Taliban, <u>visited Abu Dhabi on</u> June 4 and met with Mohammed bin Zayed, the President of the United Arab Emirates. Accompanying Haqqani was the chief of the Taliban's intelligence agency. UAE's media reported that the meeting focused on <u>providing</u> <u>economic and development aid</u> to Afghanistan.

Pakistan's Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif began <u>a five-day trip to China</u> on June 4. Upon reaching Shenzhen, <u>he had a meeting</u> with Meng Fanli, the Party Secretary of the Shenzhen Municipal Committee, and Deputy Party Secretary of the Guangdong Provincial Committee. During this meeting, he extended an invitation to Chinese companies to construct SEZs in Pakistan. The National Bank of Pakistan and China-Pakistan International Silk Road Industry Investment Management Company <u>signed an MoU</u> on June 1 to support investment in key projects, promote industrial cooperation, establish special economic zones (SEZs), and boost bilateral trade.

Yohei Sasakawa, the Chairman of the Nippon Foundation and the Japanese Special Envoy for National Reconciliation in Myanmar travelled to <u>Bangladesh</u> on June 3-4. During t<u>heir meeting</u>, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina informed him that no new structures would be allowed in the Rohingya camps in Cox's Bazar. <u>Bangladesh's Home Minister</u>, Asaduzzaman Khan, made it clear that no additional Rohingya or Myanmar nationals will be permitted to enter the country.

US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin made a <u>one-day visit to Phnom Penh</u>, Cambodia on June 4, 2024. He met with Tea Seiha, the Defence Minister of Cambodia, and Prime Minister Hun Manet. His discussions included resuming military training exchanges on disaster assistance and U.N. peacekeeping, as well as de-mining and unexploded ordnance clearance. Austin stated that he held "substantive conversations about ways to strengthen U.S.-Cambodian defence ties".

Ukrainian President Volodymyr <u>Zelensky visited Manila</u> on June 3, after his unscheduled visit to Singapore during the Shangri-La Dialogue. He met with Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., who supported Ukraine's "territorial integrity and sovereignty". The two sides reiterated their support for an international rules-based order. During his visit, President Zelensky announced that Ukraine would be opening an embassy in Manila this year.

Philippine President Ferdinand <u>Marcos Jnr during his visit to Brunei</u>, signed a maritime cooperation deal with the country's monarch, Sultan Hassanal Bolkiah. The deal includes the two nations mutually developing their maritime capabilities through joint skills training, as well as research and information sharing. The leaders also signed deals on mutual recognition of education certificates and boosting tourism, as well as renewed memorandums of understanding (MOU) on food security and agricultural cooperation.

On the margins of the Shangri-La Dialogue, <u>US Secretary of Defence Llyod</u> <u>Austin</u> and China's Minister of National Defence, Admiral Dong Jun met on May 31. The meeting was the first face-to-face talk since late 2022. The ministers touched on Taiwan, China's relationship with Russia and the friction in the South China Sea.

Despite these 'constructive talks' during the Shangri-La Dialogue, the two used their speeches to deliver markedly different messages and accuse each other of escalating global tensions. While Llyod Austin hailed Washington's deepening network of security partnerships, Admiral Dong Jun denounced this formation of "exclusive military alliances and attempts to create "bloc confrontation". While Admiral Jun never explicitly criticised the US, top Chinese Defence Official, Lieutenant General Jing Jianfeng categorised the US as the "source of chaos and tension in the Indo-Pacific" and accused US of trying to build an "Asia-Pacific version of NATO". However, Admiral Jun's toughest remarks were saved for the issue of Taiwan's independence. He accused the new Taiwanese government of President Lai Ching-te of incrementally pursuing separatism and being "bent on erasing" the island's Chinese identity and emphasised through his speech that anyone who supports Taiwan will "end up in selfdestruction". In an apparent reference to the US, Dong slammed "external interfering forces" for selling arms and having "illegal official contacts" with Taiwan.

To deepen China's relations with the Arab world, Beijing hosted the 10th Ministerial Conference of the <u>China-Arab States Cooperation Forum</u> on May 30. Bahrain's King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa, Egyptian President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi, Tunisian President Kais Saied, UAE's President Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed, and the Arab League Secretary-General Ahmed Aboul Gheit attended the event. In his remarks, President Xi underscored China's commitment to working with Arab countries to maintain world peace and stability, develop high-quality Belt and Road cooperation, establish a new paradigm for harmonious coexistence among civilisations, and promote global governance. He reiterated China's support for a two-state solution to the Israel-Palestine conflict.

On May 31, President Biden proposed a <u>three-phase plan</u> to end the hostilities between Israel and Hamas in Gaza. The first phase involves a "complete ceasefire" and an increase in humanitarian aid with the release of some remaining Israeli hostages. In the second phase, hostilities will cease permanently, Israeli forces will withdraw from Gaza, and the remaining hostages will be released. Reconstruction of Gaza will be the final phase of this plan. Foreign Ministers of the UAE, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Jordan, and Egypt welcomed the US' proposal and urged Israel and Hamas to engage with it "seriously and positively".

In the wake of continued rocket and drone attacks from Hezbollah on northern Israel, IDF Chief of Staff, Lt. Gen. Herzi Halevi warned that <u>Israel is reaching a</u> <u>decisive point</u> and could launch an offensive against Hezbollah in Lebanon.

## **Central Asia**

President of Kyrgyzstan, Sadyr Japarov <u>welcomed Kiyoto Tsuji</u>, the state minister for Foreign Affairs of Japan, for a diplomatic meeting to bolster bilateral ties between the two nations on June 3. The press service of the Kyrgyz President underscored the meeting's focus on <u>enhancing political dialogue</u>, inter-parliamentary relations and fostering growth across various sectors, including trade, economy, culture, and humanitarian endeavours.

The sixth meeting of the Enhanced Strategic Partnership Dialogue (ESPD) between Kazakhstan and the United States was held under the aegis of Kazakhstan's Deputy Foreign Minister Akan Rakhmetullin and Assistant Secretary for the Bureau of South and Central Asian Affairs Donald Lu, in Washington, on May 31, 2024. During the meeting, the representatives summed up the rest of the joint work over the past period, synchronises their views on current bilateral and regional issues and outlines further plans for the development and deepening of the enhanced strategic partnership, with a special emphasis on aspects of political and economic cooperation. The participants also discussed projected outcomes of the meeting between Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs of Kazakhstan, Murat Nurtleu and US Secretary of State, Antony Blinken.

On June 3, the <u>President of Uzbekistan signed a decree</u> cancelling the exclusive rights of several state-owned companies to conduct economic activities. The issuance of this decree indicates the leadership's dedication to implementing substantial and complex reforms to create a free market. Starting January 1, 2025, Uzmetkombinat, Uzvtortsvetmet, Uztransgaz, UzGasTrade, Uzkimyoimpeks, and Uzenergosotish will lose their exclusive and monopoly rights. First assistant to the president, Saida Mirziyoyeva emphasized the significance of the decree in aligning with Uzbekistan's aspirations to join the World Trade Organization (WTO) by the 14<sup>th</sup> Ministerial Conference in Cameroon in 2026.

## Indian Ocean Region

<u>INS Shivalik</u>, mission deployed to the South China Sea and Pacific Ocean, departed Singapore for onward passage to Yokosuka, Japan. The ship is scheduled to participate in JIMEX 24 and RIMPAC 24.

Aligning with the Government of India's initiatives 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat' and 'Make in India', recently the Indian Navy has made significant strides in its pursuit of indigenisation. On May 29, M/s Suryadipta Projects Pvt Ltd, an MSME shipyard delivered the '<u>Ammunition Cum Torpedo Cum Missile Barge, LSAM</u> 20' to the Indian Navy.

Furthermore, on May 31, the steel-cutting ceremony for the first <u>Next-Generation Offshore Patrol Vessel (NGOPV)</u> took place at the Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL) in Mumbai. On June 3, 2024, the <u>keel-laying</u> <u>ceremony</u> for the second Cadet Training Ship was held at M/s L&T Shipyard in Kattupalli.
