South Asian leaders — India's Minister of External Affairs, Dr. S. Jaishankar; Nepal's Prime Minister, K.P. Sharma Oli; Pakistan's Prime Minister, Shahbaz Sharif; Bhutan's Prime Minister, Tshering Tobgay; and Maldives President, Dr. Mohammad Muizzu — travelled to New York to attend the 79th session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA). During his address at the UNGA, <u>Dr.</u> <u>Jaishankar emphasised</u> the importance of UN reforms and stated that it is crucial to include all regions of the world in decision-making processes regarding significant global issues. Bhutan's Prime Minister, Tshering Tobgay, expressed his commitment to supporting <u>India's bid for a permanent</u> seat at the United Nations Security Council (UNSC). The heads of state from the UK, France, Portugal, and Russia also expressed their support for <u>India's permanent</u> <u>seat</u> on the UNSC in their speeches.

The third <u>quadrilateral Meeting</u> of Foreign Ministers China, Iran, Pakistan, and Russian, on Afghanistan was held on September 27 on the sidelines of the UNGA. The joint statement highlighted the shared concern of all the countries regarding the presence of terrorist organisations in Afghanistan, posing a threat to regional stability. They emphasised the need to enhance counterterrorism collaboration at both the bilateral and multilateral levels.

On the sidelines of UNGA, Professor Yunus, Chief Adviser of Bangladesh, engaged with the leaders and officials from the UN and International Financial Institutions. The <u>Chinese foreign minister</u> characterised Yunus as a "trusted friend of the Chinese people" during their meeting. Ajay Banga, the President of the <u>World Bank</u> (WB), promised to provide \$3.5 billion in support of the reform efforts undertaken by Bangladesh's interim government. Professor Yunus urged for the <u>revival of SAARC</u> during a meeting with Pakistan's PM Shabaz Sharif. President of the <u>European Commission</u> Ursula Von der Leyen has assured Chief Adviser Professor Muhammad Yunus that "Bangladesh can count on Europe's support" in its reform drive. <u>US Secretary of State</u> Antony Blinken provided reassurance that the United States would aid Bangladesh in reclaiming the billions of dollars that were allegedly stolen and sent out of the country by individuals connected to the previous regime.

The <u>8th India-Indonesia Foreign Office Consultations</u> were convened in New Delhi on September 26, 2024. The Indian delegation was led by Jaideep Mazumdar, Secretary (East), Ministry of External Affairs and the Indonesian delegation was led by Abdul Kadir Jailani, Director General for Asia-Pacific and African Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The two sides reviewed bilateral ties including political exchanges, defence and security, maritime domain, trade ϑ investment, healthcare, connectivity, science and technology, space, tourism, culture and people-to-people exchanges.

Vietnam's President To Lam held a <u>bilateral meeting with U.S. President Joe</u> <u>Biden</u> in New York, on the sidelines of the United Nations General Assembly on September 25, 2024. The two leaders discussed opportunities to advance cooperation on a range of economic, technology, security, and diplomatic issues. The two leaders reaffirmed the importance of maintaining peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific – especially in the South China Sea. President Lam remarked that "Vietnam will continue to firmly implement its foreign policy of independence, self-reliance, multilateralism and diversification".

On September 25, the Philippines reported that a Chinese navy helicopter <u>shadowed and approached a Philippines fisheries bureau aircraft</u>. The Philippines aircraft was on patrol near the disputed Scarborough Shoal and completed its mission despite the hindrance. This comes after the Philippine defence minister told China to withdraw vessels from its EEZ and accused the country of meddling in its defence activities. Regarding the U.S. mid-range missile launcher for training, Philippines Defence Secretary Gilberto Teodoro stated, "China is saying that they are alarmed, but that is interference into our internal affairs".

A Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF) <u>JS Sazanami (DD-113) sailed</u> <u>south through the Taiwan Strait</u> on September 25, 2024, for the first time. The guided-missile destroyer was accompanied by a Royal Australian Navy (RAN) destroyer and a Royal New Zealand Navy fleet oiler. The fleet headed to the South China Sea for joint exercises. China responded strongly to the activity with <u>Foreign Ministry spokesman Lin Jian</u> stating that "China is highly vigilant about the political intentions of Japan's actions and has lodged stern representations with Japan". This comes a week after China's Liaoning aircraft carrier, accompanied by two destroyers, sailed between two Japanese islands near Taiwan for <u>the first time</u>.

The Philippines, United States, Australia, Japan and New Zealand conducted a <u>Maritime Cooperative Activity (MCA)</u> within the Philippines' Exclusive Economic Zone in the South China Sea, on September 28, 2024. The exercises included training on routine multilateral surface operations, deck landings, hoisting, and search and rescue. The aim of the exercise was to enhance cooperation, interoperability, and combined capabilities in the maritime domain, contributing to peace, and stability, and upholding the freedom of navigation and overflight in the Indo-Pacific region.

The Chinese Foreign Minister <u>Wang Yi held a meeting with the US Secretary of</u> <u>State Antony J. Blinken</u>, on the margins of the 79th UN General Assembly, in New York on September 27, 2024. The two sides discussed counternarcotics cooperation to disrupt the flow of synthetic drugs and precursor chemicals into the United States, military-to-military communication, and talks on artificial intelligence risk and safety. The contentious issues in bilateral relations of technology, human rights, Taiwan and people-to-people exchanges were also discussed.

Hezbollah's leader <u>Hassan Nasrallah was killed in an Israeli airstrike</u> in Beirut, Lebanon on September 27. US President Joe Biden stressed that <u>Nasrallah's</u> <u>death is a "measure of justice"</u> for the thousands of Americans, Israelis, and Lebanese civilians who were victims of Hezbollah terrorist attacks over the years. Meanwhile, Iran launched around 200 <u>ballistic missiles towards Israel</u> on October 1, which could result in a direct conflict between Iran and Israel. The <u>Israeli military pledged to respond</u> to Iran's "severe and dangerous escalation", while the US reaffirmed its unwavering support for Israel's defence and security. The US has moved three additional F-15E, F-16, and A-10 aircraft squadrons to the Middle East to <u>mitigate the risk of a broader regional conflict</u>.

As part of its efforts to strike a decisive blow against Hezbollah, the Israeli Defence Forces (IDF) began a <u>limited ground incursion into southern Lebanon</u>. <u>Russia</u> and <u>China</u> opposed Israel's infringement of Lebanon's sovereignty, security, and territorial integrity, and urged Tel Aviv to take concrete steps to de-escalate the conflict. Saudi Arabia expressed concern over the developments in Lebanon without referring to Nasrallah's killing, while the <u>UAE, Bahrain, and Qatar have remained silent</u>.

Amidst the escalation of tensions in West Asia, India's Prime Minister Narendra Modi spoke with Israel's Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu on September 30. PM Modi reaffirmed <u>India's zero-tolerance policy against terrorism</u> and stressed the need to prevent regional escalation of the conflict while ensuring the safe release of hostages.

During the 79th session of the United Nations General Assembly Debate, <u>Turkmenistan defined its strategic partnership</u> priorities with the UN, highlighting peace and security, sustainable development, climate change, and humanitarian issues. According to the ministry, these priorities were presented by Foreign Minister Rashid Meredov on September 25. Meredov said that Turkmenistan aims to strengthen peace and trust in the field of security by advancing mechanisms of preventive diplomacy and peacebuilding. The minister also highlighted the importance of supporting Afghanistan in its economic recovery and addressing humanitarian issues, citing the construction of the strategic Turkmenistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan-India (TAPI) gas pipeline and other infrastructure projects.

During the Sustainable Development and Security in the Eurasian Space conference on September 30, President of Kazakhstan Kassym-Jomart Tokayev put forward the idea of <u>indivisible Eurasian security</u> as the cornerstone for establishing a multipolar global order. Tokayev emphasised the growing significance of diplomacy in the midst of unprecedented geopolitical instability. He stressed the urgent need for a détente and a new constructive dialogue agenda within the international community. According to Tokayev, the concept of a comprehensive, indivisible Eurasian security has the potential to form the basis for creating a fair, multipolar, and sustainable world order.

Armenian Deputy Prime Minister Mher Grigoryan <u>welcomed</u> Prime Minister of Belarus Roman Golovchenko, Prime Minister of Kazakhstan Olzhas Bektenov, and Prime Minister of the Russian Federation Mikhail Mishustin on September 30. They arrived in Armenia to participate in the regular session of the Council of Ministers of the Eurasian Intergovernmental Council and the Third Eurasian Economic Forum being held in Yerevan, Armenia. <u>During the plenary opening session</u> on September 30, the participants discussed the infrastructure and agricultural logistics, law enforcement practice and antitrust regulation in cross-border markets, Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU) online trading platforms, technical regulation of online trade in the EAEU, as well as the prospects and advantages of the EAEU single electricity market. The Eurasian Intergovernmental Council approved a Roadmap for the implementation of the transport policy of the Eurasian Economic Union member states for 2024-2026 at a meeting in Yerevan on October 1.

Indian Ocean Region

The 2nd edition of the Indian Ocean Rim Association (IORA) seminar on Illegal, Unreported, and Unregulated (IUU) Fishing took place at the Naval War College in Goa on September 25, 2024. This significant event gathered delegates from 17 IORA member countries, including Australia, Bangladesh, France, Indonesia, Kenya, Madagascar, Mozambique, Malaysia, Maldives, Mauritius, Oman, Somalia, South Africa, Seychelles, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and Tanzania. The seminar addressed the growing challenges posed by IUU fishing in the Indian Ocean Region (IOR), discussing its economic, environmental, and security implications. Participants also engaged in dialogues to identify legal gaps and collaborative strategies among member states to combat this issue effectively.

On October 1, 2024, the Houthis <u>launched</u> an explosive-laden drone that struck the Panama-flagged oil tanker Cordelia Moon, located approximately 110 kilometers off the port city of Hodeida, Yemen. This attack resulted in damage to one of the tanker's ballast tanks, as confirmed by the multinational Joint Maritime Information Center and private security firm Ambrey. In addition to the drone strike, a missile targeted another vessel, identified as the Liberianflagged bulk carrier Minoan Courage, which was also en route to the Suez Canal and had armed security on board. There were no reported injuries or significant damage from this missile strike

Ethiopia's Foreign Affairs Minister Taye Atske Selassie <u>addressed</u> the 79th Session of the United Nations General Assembly on September 28, 2024, expressing grave concerns over recent actions in the Horn of Africa. In his speech, Taye highlighted, the urgent need to establish a new framework for inclusive maritime security engagement in the Red Sea and Indian Ocean. He urged for equal participation from all countries in the region to enhance collaboration and ensure stability, particularly in light of rising threats from terrorism and piracy. He also defended, Ethiopia's recent Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Somalia, asserting that it is grounded in the current political realities in Somalia.
